

Dear Mr. Herron,

I am pleased to present you with the 2022 Annual Report for the Wheeling Fire Department.

2022 represented the first full year serving as Chief of the department. My focus has been divided between projects started by the previous administration, as well as, moving forward with the completion of new projects.

- o In late 2021 and early 2022, we took delivery of two new Ford F-450 ambulances and a new Sutphen pumper. Engine-9 will serve our Warwood section of the city.
- We were also fortunate enough to receive a FEMA Assistance to Firefighters Grant for \$400,000.
 It allowed us to replace dated SCBA equipment making conditions safer for our crews.
- Breaking ground on the new Fire Headquarters project in August, put us one step closer to our new facility in late 2023. Upgrades to our other existing stations are ongoing as well.
- A new heavy rescue unit is on order. But due to the current climate in the industry, we will not be taking delivery of this unit until 2024.
- We are also in the process of upgrading our rescue equipment. We are adding a new set of Hurst Jaws of Life tools and a Paratech system which is multifaceted across several disciplines of rescue.

Two smaller grant opportunities – one for COVID expenditures and one for WV Workforce – allowed us to make upgrades to ALS ambulance equipment, acquire our first accelerant detection canine for the investigations division, and purchase a drone. The drone has fire and rescue applications – there is also the possibility of augmenting the WPD drone on joint missions.

We also received a FEMA Assistance to Firefighters Grant for \$338,000 that is earmarked for paramedic training over the next few years.

With the continued support of the City of Wheeling administration, City Council, State of West Virginia, federal government, our citizens, and the business community, we will continue to meet the current and future needs for service.

In closing, I would like to recognize the hard work of the men and women of the Wheeling Fire Department. Their continued dedication, effort, and commitment to duty carry on the tradition of service to our community that began in 1869.

BUREAU OF FIRE PREVENTION

Our safety message was presented to thousands of citizens in 2022. Safety talks were presented at every Wheeling Housing Authority property. Fire extinguisher training was held for local businesses, care facilities, and civic groups. Seasonal messages were broadcast to raise public awareness on issues such as: smoke detectors, kitchen safety, space heaters, and holiday lights.

FIRE SAFETY HOUSE visited every elementary school in Ohio County throughout the spring, summer, and fall. Students practiced fire safety skills and were given age-appropriate materials to reinforce the message.

The Fire Safety House was at other locations too – numerous fairs, festivals, and community events. Simulated fire drills taught children and adults how to escape a fire in the home. It was also a component of Wheeling Hospital's Safety Town – an annual two-week summer program designed for young children.

PLAN REVIEW Dozens of architectural drawings were reviewed for fire and life safety compliance to federal, state, and local codes. City projects in 2022 included new construction and renovations to existing buildings – such as the new parking garage, housing complexes, and the historic Fort Henry Club.

OPEN BURN PERMITS were issued throughout the year in accordance with the WV Division of Forestry guidelines. Every burn site was inspected prior to permit approval. Due to the citywide cleanup efforts following the June 14 derecho, there was an uptick in the number of permits issued.

FIRE AND LIFE SAFETY
INSPECTIONS were conducted
at existing commercial
properties in Wheeling and at
every new business prior to its
opening day.

FIREWORKS Every fireworks display required a safety inspection. Independence Day was marked by public safety messages through all media formats. Because fireworks can cause serious burns and injuries, BFP recommended leaving them to the experts.



FIREPUP The generosity of the Wheeling community has increased donations tenfold in past years. These gifts allowed the BFP to expand our community outreach programs. In 2022, donations provided the means to add a mascot, FirePup. FirePup captivated the public with every appearance. Children were especially responsive to his fire safety message.

NATIONAL FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

100th Anniversary

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK TOOK PLACE FROM OCTOBER 9 TO OCTOBER 15.

It commemorates the Great Chicago Fire – a massive fire that killed 250 people, left 100,000 people homeless, destroyed over 17,400 structures, and burned over 2,000 acres.

The **"FIRE WON'T WAIT. PLAN YOUR ESCAPE"** theme is a message for all age groups. There are simple but important actions people can take to protect themselves and others from home fires.

"Being prepared is the best preventative measure you can take to ensure you and those inside your house can be ready to escape should a fire occur," Assistant Fire Chief Deric Jamison said. "Working smoke detectors double your chance of survival in a home fire."

"Fires occur quickly – you don't have time to think. Always have two ways out just in case your primary exit is blocked by fire or an object. Fire doesn't wait. It's fast – so get out and stay out."

To spread this message with the community, Wheeling firefighters staffed informational tables at the Mount De Chantal Kroger, Warwood Kroger, Elm Grove Riesbeck's, and the Centre Market house throughout the week.

HOME FIRE SAFETY

WORKING SMOKE DETECTORS SAVE LIVES.

- Install them inside every sleeping room, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level of your home.
- They should be interconnected when one sounds, they all sound.
- Design a workable escape plan for your household including seniors, children, and those with sensory or physical disabilities.
- Always have two ways out.
- Make sure all doors and windows open easily.
- Have an outside meeting place a safe distance from your home.
- Practice home fire drills at least twice a year with the entire household. Hold a drill during the day and one at night.

THREAT PREPAREDNESS TRAINING

A challenging three-day course, conducted by Louisiana State University personnel, was held at the former Ohio Valley Medical Center. WFD and other public safety agencies joined forces to participate in a series of threat preparedness scenarios. WVNCC students participated as actors.

Instructors from law enforcement, fire, EMS, and emergency management agencies offered hands-on training and critiques. Teams and leaders had to think on their feet and use their skills and resources wisely.

The fire service is an active learning environment.

VEHICLE EXTRICATION

IN MARCH, FIRST RESPONDERS HAD A UNIQUE OPPORTUNITY TO PRACTICE THEIR EXTRICATION SKILLS.

A mock vehicle accident – between a passenger vehicle and a retired Ohio County school bus – was staged at WFD's training facility.

Braden's Towing took part by demonstrating rotator capabilities. Ohio County Schools personnel were also present to share their vehicle accident plan.









WFD personnel train throughout the year to maintain a state of readiness. Incidents fall into one of these categories: fire, EMS, rescue, hazardous materials, and service calls.



BUREAU OF FIRE INVESTIGATIONS

IN 2002, WFD RESPONDED TO 139 FIRES. FORTUNATELY, THERE WERE NO FATALITIES.

To analyze a fire scene and determine its cause, Captain Davidson and Lieutenant Landis have completed extensive training with these agencies:

The National Fire Academy
IAAI - International Association of Arson Investigators
West Virginia State Police
Federal Law Enforcement Training Center

Whenever there is a fire, the officers in the Bureau of Fire Investigations respond to the scene. They are tasked with documenting the fire scene, collecting samples, interviewing eyewitnesses, assisting displaced residents, and reporting the results.

Now they have a new partner – a Belgian Malinois named Indy. **She's an accelerant detection canine.** This means she can detect and locate trace amounts of accelerants left behind at a fire scene. 3-year-old Indy will work alongside the officers whenever a fire breaks out in the city.

Indy was acquired from Pennsylvania's Stateline Canine Training Center in October. She joined the department after Lt. Landis completed a canine handlers course. He learned specific commands to maximize her skills and also how to care for her – particularly after exposure to a fire scene. The partners train together on a regular basis – often in downtown Wheeling. This regimen promotes Indy's fitness and readiness to investigate the next fire scene.

LEFT 2141 Market Street fire

June 14 1:37 AM

A derecho struck Wheeling causing citywide emergencies – in this case, a downed power line caused a fire on the rear of the structure near the roofline.

Visible fire & heavy electrical arcing

The residents escaped without injury. Three firefighters were injured.

RIGHT 1415 Jacob Street fire

August 13 12:23 PM

Responded to a report of heavy smoke. Arrived on scene to find multiple buildings involved. An exterior attack was initiated due to heavy fire.

Cumberland Trail and Glen Dale ladder companies provided mutual aid.

All occupants exited the building safely. The cause was undetermined.

MISSION LIFELINE GOLD PLUS AWARD

For the second consecutive year, WFD earned a coveted Mission Lifeline Gold Plus award from the American Heart Association.

This award recognizes the EMS providers for their response to **HEART ATTACK, STROKE, AND CARDIAC ARREST** emergencies.

EVERY MINUTE COUNTS FOR THESE HIGH-RISK PATIENTS.

EMS providers communicate with emergency room staff in real time. Their assessment often means transporting the patient directly to Wheeling Hospital's Cardiac Cath Lab to begin treatment. Bypassing the emergency room saves valuable time and boosts positive outcomes.

EMS patients may be experiencing a cardiac, airway, trauma, or other emergency.

Wheeling Fire Department squads respond 24/7. The average squad response time is 3 minutes.




Congratulations!

What's a derecho? ONE STRUCK WHEELING ON JUNE 14, 2022.

Thunderstorm clusters, gusts up to 70 mph, and fierce straight-line winds resulted in flash flooding. Hundreds of mature trees were either uprooted or snapped in two. Power lines were pulled down. Roads were blocked. Wheeling Park and homes in the Park View area were in the storm's crosshairs.

Three WFD firefighters were injured after responding to a fire caused by the storm. Fortunately, after treatment at Wheeling Hospital, they returned home to their families.

Property damage and power outages were widespread. West Virginia Governor Jim Justice declared a state-of-emergency for Ohio County.

150th Anniversary – Station 4

THERE HAS BEEN A FIREHOUSE AT 3618 JACOB STREET FOR 150 YEARS.

The City's South Wheeling firefighters held an Open House on Sunday, March 13 to celebrate this amazing anniversary. Station 4's primary response district extends from 27th Street to the city limits at 48th Street.

Wheeling Fire Department personnel invited the community to get a behind-the-scenes look. Visitors toured the station, checked out apparatus and firefighting equipment, and learned more about this station's long history. FirePup, the department's mascot, was also on hand to greet visitors.

Construction on the original station began in 1871 – shortly after the town of South Wheeling was incorporated into the City of Wheeling. **Station 4 opened its doors on March 13, 1872.** But according to historical documents, there was little fanfare.

Nicknamed the "8th Ward Hose House", Station 4 is the only WFD station that has retained its original designation and truck number. When the original structure was torn down in 1953, the firefighters were forced to work out of the nearby Cooey-Bentz warehouse. The current building was built the following year. It houses Engine-4 and Squad-3.

ENGINE-9

IS THE NEWEST ADDITION TO THE WFD FLEET.

The 2022 Sutphen 1750 GPM pumper was put into service on June 5, 2022.

E-9 is an upgrade from the former 1987 model.

WFD Station 9 is located at 1301 Richland Avenue in Warwood.

This ladder truck was in service at every major fire scene in Wheeling from 1973 through 2020. Ladder-13 WAS RETIRED FROM WFD'S FLEET AFTER 47 YEARS OF SERVICE.

Honor Guard members drill regularly to prepare for duty at funerals, parades, and civic ceremonies. They carry the American flag and either the City flag or their Local-12 flag. **OUR COUNTRY'S FLAG IS SYMBOLICALLY PROTECTED BY TWO FIREFIGHTING TOOLS – A PIKE POLE AND AN AXE.**














WHEELING FIRE DEPARTMENT

In 1869, City Council passed an ordinance to establish and regulate a paid fire department for Wheeling.

WILLIAM WINDER WAS SWORN IN AS THE FIRST FIRE CHIEF.

HE SET UP TWO RESPONSE DISTRICTS THAT WERE DIVIDED BY WHEELING CREEK. THEN HE ORGANIZED FOUR FIRE COMPANIES.

AT THAT TIME, FIRES WERE FOUGHT WITH STEAM FIRE ENGINES, HOSE CARRIAGES, AND EVEN AN EARLY HOOK-AND-LADDER TRUCK. THE APPARATUS WERE DRAWN EITHER BY A TEAM OF HORSES OR BY MEN. EARLY ARRIVALS ROUTINELY SENT THE HORSES BACK TO THE FIRE HOUSE TO PULL ANOTHER HOSE CARRIAGE TO THE SCENE.
