FLOOD EMERGENCY



On Saturday, June 14, flash flooding devastated the area, prompting dozens of rescue calls and forcing the closure of multiple roads and bridges for days.

Tragically, nine lives were lost, making it the largest mass casualty incident in Ohio County's history.

WFD worked tirelessly alongside multiple agencies in response to the crisis.

Crews pulled more than 75 vehicles from Little Wheeling and Big Wheeling Creek, searched creek banks for survivors, and checked dozens of homes.

They also helped clear significant debris lodged under several bridges to restore access and improve safety. WFD was honored to support not only the City of Wheeling but also our neighbors in Triadelphia and Valley Grove during this difficult time.

Just one week later, severe storms returned, causing additional flooding in several neighborhoods.

NEW R-1 NOW IN SERVICE



In April, we officially placed the new Rescue 1 into service!

After arriving from the manufacturer earlier this year, R-1 underwent extensive inspections, additional equipment installations, and training sessions for our personnel.

The new truck brings expanded capabilities, improved tool storage, increased efficiency, and, most importantly, a higher level of safety for our crews.

Rescue 1 is quartered at Station 2 in North Wheeling. Our old R-1 will now serve as a reserve unit, ready to step in when needed.
