TRAINING NEWS

WFD received hands-on training from Insight Fire Training of North Carolina on their new thermal imaging cameras that will be used by the department.

The cameras, purchased through the Community Development Block Grant, will enhance the department's search and rescue capabilities during a fire incident. The cameras allow firefighters to see through smoke, making it easier to locate trapped victims. Temperature feedback allows firefighters to locate the fire faster and can predict changing environments to keep them safe.
