Dear Mr. Herron,

Please review the 2017 Annual Report for the City of Wheeling Fire Department.

The Wheeling Fire Department continues to meet the level of service our citizens have become accustomed to. We have even accelerated some areas of our public service training programs. In 2017, the WFD responded to 6,648 calls for service. Of these, 63% were Rescue and Emergency Medical Service calls.

The City of Wheeling Fire Department continues to search for funding sources that will allow us to accomplish our goals. Our efforts in Training, Fire Prevention, Investigations, and Vehicle Maintenance keep our members sharp, the equipment ready, and make for a safer community. One exciting change was the implementation of electronic emergency medical reporting. This method saves time in the field, enhances our ability to keep more accurate records, and will boost our data return to assist in planning and trends.

Continued training, new technology, and the dedication of our personnel have proven to serve our department well. Once again, the Wheeling Fire Department has received recognition from the American Heart Association for outstanding services related to pre-hospital heart attack care. The WFD earned the Mission Lifeline Silver Plus rating – an award given to only four agencies in West Virginia. Statistically, it puts our department on track to be the first in West Virginia to receive the Gold rating in 2018.

Our members continue to assist with the expansion of our Wheeling Island Training Facility – adding props for skills training, as well as, expansion for storage. This facility has become a great asset to the Wheeling Fire Department's training program. It also benefits departments from the surrounding area. We continue to receive the support of West Virginia Public Service Training (formerly known as RESA) in our effort to provide up-to-the-minute training opportunities for firefighters.

With your support and that of the City Council, we realized the replacement of two much needed staff vehicles. 2018 Ford Police Utility vehicles replaced my 2004 Chevrolet Impala and the Duty Chief's 2012 Ford Expedition. Plans for future fleet improvements are being made as well.

I would be remiss to not recognize our firefighters for their behind-the-scenes dedication to the community. They are involved in fundraisers supporting the Muscular Dystrophy Association, Breast Cancer Awareness, Augusta Levy, and numerous other charitable projects. They actively promote firefighter and city legislative concerns; and they also participate in programs which directly benefit Wheeling's youth.

The City of Wheeling Fire Department is grateful for the continued support of your office and the City Council. We will continue to prepare ourselves for any emergency scenario, including Haz-Mat and Swift Water, that may arise. We will respond promptly to the needs of those who live in and visit our great city. And we will strive to provide the best possible care to all.








2017 MISSION LIFELINE AWARD - Silver Plus

WFD won a coveted Mission Lifeline Silver Plus Award from the American Heart Association.


This award recognizes EMS providers for their response to heart attack, stroke, and cardiac arrest emergencies. Every minute counts for these high-risk patients. By working seamlessly with the hospital staff, EMS providers are boosting positive outcomes.

Nearly 1000 people were trained in CPR in 2017.

CPR TRAINING – available to the community throughout the year.

WHEELING FIRE DEPARTMENT TRAINING DIVISION



PALS – Pediatric Advanced Life Support. The primary goals are to recognize life-threatening pediatric emergencies and to provide prompt assessment and treatment during the initial minutes of the emergency.

- Cardiac emergencies including cardiac arrest and cardiac arrhythmias
- **Respiratory emergencies** including upper and lower airway obstructions, lung tissue disease, and disordered control of breathing.
- **Shock** including hypovolemic, obstructive, distributive, and cardiogenic shock.


ACLS – Advanced Cardiovascular Life Support. The primary goals are to recognize life-threatening cardiac problems and to provide prompt assessment and treatment during the initial minutes of the emergency.

- **Basics of CPR** Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation
- Advanced treatment options
- Conditions leading to cardiac arrest
 - o Respiratory arrest
 - o Bradycardia
 - o Tachycardia
 - o Acute coronary syndrome
 - o Stroke

ITLS – International Trauma Life Support is hands-on and intensive. Its purpose is to provide the fundamental knowledge and skills needed to get the trauma patient from the scene to surgery in the best possible condition.

WFD RESPONDED TO 135 FIRE INCIDENTS IN 2017.

Every fire scene is different. WFD Investigators undergo rigorous training at the National Fire Academy. They have a thorough knowledge of fire dynamics and excellent observation skills. At a fire scene, they follow a methodical process.

- Determine the area of origin
- Identify the ignition source
- Collect evidence
- Take eyewitness statements
- Photo documentation

The next steps are:

- Follow up interviews
- Send samples to lab for testing
- Write a report summarizing findings
- Follow case into the courts



IN THE NEWS - NOTABLE FIRES OF 2017

JANUARY 2 A second-alarm fire destroyed several homes on Virginia Street.

The Wheeling Island blaze was caused by a space heater.

Fortunately, no one was injured.

MARCH 12 Shortly after 11:30 PM, WFD responded to a vehicle fire on

McColloch Street near the Lind Street intersection. Assistant Chief Paul Harto – off duty at the time – his son, Tyler, and Wheeling Police officers were able to pull the driver out of the

burning car. No one was seriously hurt.

AUGUST 24 Firefighters responded to a fire directly from a public safety

ceremony. The fire broke out at a house on 13th Street in East

Wheeling.

OCTOBER 5 For the second time in 2017, the house at 105 South Huron

Street caught on fire. This time, however, the Wheeling Island

home was completely destroyed.

OCTOBER 28 A house fire in Center Wheeling closed a number of ramps in the

26th Street area. The home's second floor was severely

damaged, but the family escaped without injuries.



The Well-equipped Squad



Wheeling Fire Department squads respond to emergencies 24/7.

Medical calls can be trauma, cardiac, airway, or other emergencies. Companies arrive in minutes to assist patients who are ill or injured. The paramedics communicate in real time with Emergency Room staff at the destination hospital – OVAC or Wheeling Hospital. This raises the level of patient care and boosts positive outcomes.

Trauma Emergencies

- Wound management & bandaging
- Fluid replacement & blood loss management
- Splinting & immobilization

Cardiac Emergencies

- Myocardial infarction (heart attack)
- Dysrhythmia (irregular heartbeat)
- Drug administration Ex. Epinephrine

Respiratory Emergencies

- Supplemental oxygen
- Continuous Positive Airway Pressure (CPAP)
- Advanced Airway
 - o Endotracheal tube
 - o King airway
- Nebulized Medicine

Other Medical Emergencies


- Drug overdose
- Diabetic Emergency
- Allergic reaction

SWAT Medics

Specialized medical supplies valued at \$5000 were donated by Wheeling Hospital



Wheeling Fire Department SWAT Medics train alongside their counterparts in the City's Police Department. They are trained to the level of a basic SWAT operator, and fulfil a specific role on tactical missions.

They are in the field to provide medical support to casualties – injured team members, innocent bystanders, and suspects. Immediate treatment will dramatically impact patient outcomes and save lives.

- Skilled paramedics
- Military-type uniforms and protective gear
- Carry specialized medical supplies














Severe weather caused widespread flash flooding in February and July.

Both floods were caused by two consecutive weekends of heavy rainfall. Sections of National Road became a turbulent lake. Entire neighborhoods filled with flood water, mud, and debris. Vehicles stalled and basements flooded.

Fire Department personnel rescued people trapped in stalled vehicles, moved people out of flooded homes, assessed neighborhood damage, and pumped out basements once the water subsided.



The first victim was found downstream clinging to a guard rail. An active search continued along the length of the creek, around the bridges, and through heavy debris.

The WFD Swift Water team joined multiple agencies – the Ohio County Sheriff's office, Wheeling Police Department, Tyler County Search and Rescue, the National Guard, Civil Air Patrol – and dozens of civilian volunteers searching for the second victim. The search ended five days later; and the Ohio Valley mourned the loss of its two young people.

Community Outreach

Firefighters have a strong community service record. They participate in a variety of events to promote fire safety, education, and health. Here is a sampling:

Smoke detectors. A working smoke detector can double your likelihood of surviving a house fire. Firefighters teamed up with the Red Cross, Ohio County Schools, and other volunteers to install smoke detectors in Wheeling homes. Families could sign up for the free smoke detectors provided by the Red Cross. The program honors the memory of the Daugherty family – they perished in a fire in October 2016.

A working smoke detector can double your chance of surviving a house fire.











Virtual Dementia Tour. Firefighters and Sheriff's deputies met at WFD headquarters to experience the everyday challenges that Alzheimer's and dementia patients face. The tour was initiated by the Right At Home organization. Volunteers wore devices that altered their vision, hearing, touch, and depth perception. They learned that simple tasks – such as eating – were no longer so simple.



100 Years ago...

One of the largest fires in Wheeling's history took place on December 9, 1917.

The House & Herrmann department store, a six-story structure at 14th and Market Streets, was a total loss.

- Caused by a natural gas explosion
 - o A stove lit by the night watchman had a slow leak.
 - o Flames traveled through the elevator shaft.
- Firefighters responded from: Wheeling, Bellaire, Bridgeport, Martins Ferry
- No injuries or fatalities
- Loss was a staggering \$500,000
 - o That equals \$10,406,552 in 2017.
 - o The business did not recover.
- Weather was a factor single digit temperatures and gusty winds
- The modern WFD ladder truck was crushed when the building collapsed.
