INCLUSIVE BASKETBALL AT 36TH ST PARK



PROPOSED BY

THE PROJECT

The goal of this project is to improve 36th St. Park's accessibility and inclusivity through the installation of a Bankshot[™] Basketball system (pictured in cover photo and Figure 1) to a 37' x 91' asphalt space adjacent to the playground (see Figure 2). By installing this system, kids and adults of all mobilities and abilities would find a recreation opportunity unlike any other in the city and the state of West Virginia.

THE LOCATION

In addition to serving the South Wheeling neighborhood, Wheeling at large, and the Ohio Valley, Ritchie Elementary (see Figure 3 for location) has a student population of 300 and is located across the street from the south end of the park. Approximately 30 of these students receive special education services that cannot be found in other Ohio County Schools. This system would be perfect for this school to use with their entire population as a lesson in learning through play, socialization, and inclusion.

THE NEED

The Bankshot[™] system would serve the citizens as a free recreational activity for all ages, skills, and mobility. With its flat surface and non-aggressive play, this system is perfect for citizens in wheelchairs and walkers. This would improve the 36th St Park's accessibility and inclusivity for the 645 children in Ohio County Schools with congnitive and ambulatory difficulties.

THE SYSTEM

Bankshot[™] Basketball is a course of various sized hoops and backboards that are configured at angles and as curves. These configurations challenge the player to apply critical thinking in addition to physical performance of shooting a basketball. Shots are taken from various distances for incremental points as players move around the course in a loop. In the words of Bankshot[™] Sports, "participants play alongside, not against, each other."

The Augusta Levy Learning Center is ecstatic to support the effort to establish an accessible basketball court to benefit the people of the Ohio Valley. Augusta Levy Learning Center's mission is designed to maximize the benefits of best practices and propel children with autism to reach their highest potential. At ALLC, we want to break down the barriers of accessibility not only for the students that attend the Center, but also for all individuals with disabilities. Approximately 75% of children with autism also suffer from a condition called Sensory Processing Disorder (SPD), which at times can keep them from participating in events with their typical peers. Play is essential to a child's development. It is an all-encompassing activity that helps to develop different skills such as social, intellectual, emotional and physical abilities. For children with disabilities these skills are important for their development; however, the physical environment of a playground or typical basketball court can be difficult to master and thereby be an obstacle for participating in play activities.

The Augusta Levy Learning Center recently went through the process of designing an all-inclusive playground for children of all abilities and worked closely with the city and the Parks and Recreation Department. We feel that the addition of an inclusive basketball court at the 36th Street Park is not only beneficial addition to the community but a crucial piece to our children's development.
