

VOLUNTEER HIGHLIGHTS

- o April: 2nd Annual Make Wheeling Shine Day
 - 60+ Williams Lea employees & citizens
 - 85 bags = 1700 pounds of trash
 - 10 tires removed
 - 1 mile of road cleaned
 - 1.25 miles of trail; 3.5 miles of creek
 - 5 acres of park areas
 - Cost Savings (labor) = \$4,577.40





- June: 3rd Annual Pride in Wheeling
 - o 61 Orrick employees & 54 outside volunteers
 - Centre Market Landscaping: flower planting, mulching, weeding
 - Heritage Trail Maintenance: rust and graffiti removal from overpass
 - Grandview Painting: fresh coat of paint on water tanks and mural on sidewalk wall
 - Cost Savings (labor) = \$8,773.35
- October: 3rd Annual Wheeling University Physical Therapy
 Global Day of Service
 - 15 Wheeling University Graduate Students & Faculty,
 City Staff
 - Cleaning of Nelson Jordan Center indoors and surrounding woods
 - 20 bags = 400 pounds of trash
 - o Trimmed bushes & trees around facility
 - Cost Savings (labor) = \$1,144.35

We are launching recreational software, WheelingRec.com, for online scheduling, reservations, registration, and many other applications allowing us to process credit card payments for the first time. We anticipate that this will encourage registration and provide easier access to our facilities and programs.



UPCOMING PARK PROJECTS

GATEWAY PARK (WHEELING ISLAND)

- Will enhance the historic Wheeling Island neighborhood, the Suspension Bridge, provide canoe & kayak access, and provide an incredible view of Downtown Wheeling
- 6-phases, \$1.9 Million total cost
 - Funds already acquired for 2 phases





EDGINGTON LANE PARK (WOODSDALE)

- Will include full-size basketball court with cross-court options, swings, shade zone, seating, 40-yard Dash, Ninja Warrior Obstacle Course
- Considering keeping tennis court with pickleball OR converting to turf soccer (futsal) area.

INCLUSIVE BASKETBALL PROJECT (SOUTH WHEELING)

- o 36th St Park South Wheeling Pool
- Currently fundraising for installation of Bankshot Basketball System
- Innovative shooting game designed for all ages, mobilities, and abilities
- Supported by Ritchie Elementary (resides across from the park), Easter Seals, and Augusta Levy
- \$75,000 in total
